Caring for Your Voice

Healthy Voice for Life!

Paul Connelly

Why is this topic important?

35% of public have vocal damage.

58% of teachers and other occupational voice users (higher for Dance/Drama/PE) have damage.

20% of teachers report missing work due to a voice issue.

1 in 10 teachers are forced out of the profession due to voice constraints.

Even highly trained voice users are at risk.

Identify your Vocal Stresses and Vocal Load

- 1. How are you using your voice each day? Talking, singing, whispering, calling voice?
- 2. What register of your voice do you use most often?
- 3. Do you vary the pitch level of your voice?
- 4. Are you aware of your breathing habits as you are speaking? Does your breathing contribute to efficient voice function?
- 5. How many classes are you teaching each day? How long are they?
- 6. Is there anything in your teaching environment that is causing you to overuse your voice? Blower in a vent, excessive classroom noise, outside noise bleeding in?

Common Vocal Problem Areas & Dysfunction

Upper Respiratory Infection Inflammation caused by reflux

Growth on vocal folds such as nodules Papilloma

Granuloma Vocal haemorrhage, tear, or bruise

Neurological diseases (dysphonia or vocal paralysis)

Path to Maintaining a Healthy Voice

Self-Care:

Hydration - 1/2 of body weight in ounces (minimum of eight 8-ounce glasses)

Limit caffeine intake (Sorry all day coffee/soda drinkers)

Nutrition - whole grains, fruits, vegetables, aware of sugar intake, avoid reflux-causing spicy foods

Exercise - increases stamina, lung function, and muscle tone

Rest - 7-9 hours of sleep per night

Know when to rest your voice.

Environment:

40-60% humidity Avoid dry, cold air

Humidifier at night

Amplification, if necessary

Path to Maintaining a Healthy Voice cont'd.

Vocal Technique:

Warm-up before teaching
Easy onset of voicing
Be mindful of voice clearing
Reduce telephone use
Take vocal naps during the day.

Surprise Problems

Medications:

Check medications for vocal side effects

Ncvs.org

Lozenges:

Avoid menthol, eucalyptus, alcohol - can cause irritation if used for extended time USE glycerine, pectin, slippery elm - moisteners

Natural Solutions:

Vocal Rest:

Extended times of silence during the day.

Soothing Drink: (smells bad, but works)

Hot water

Lemon (natural juice, not a tea)

Honey (to taste)

Gargling:

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon honey/maple syrup

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1 cup warm water

Gargle silently, do not rinse for 5 minutes.

When to Seek Professional Help

Hoarse or raspy voice that lasts for more than three weeks
Voice loss or severe changes in vocal tone and sound
Gap in singing range (extended time)
Pain when speaking or swallowing (extended time, after vocal rest)
Difficulty swallowing
Coughing up blood
Lump in the neck

Professional Help

Seek help from Otolaryngologist or ENT who specialises in voice.

I started square dancing at Casula with Tony Allessi in about 2001. Once I saw round dancing, I knew that was my preferred dance style, so I joined Renniks Rounds at Greystanes, in 2002.

In about 2005, I thought I would take up the challenge of cueing rounds at the club. When Ray Skinner passed away I took over the running of the club under the banner of Greystanes Rounds. We continued to run this club for two nights a week: one regular dance night, one beginner night and once a month a 50/50 dance together with David Todd as our square dance Caller. We continued this even after we moved to the Central Coast.

When square dance Caller, Lorraine Long, retired from square dance calling at her club (Pelican Promenaders) at Woy Woy on the Central Coast, I ceased the Greystanes Rounds club and took over the Pelican Promenaders as a round dance club. We also continued to hold a 50/50 dance as well with Ashley Shore as out square dance Caller. We had many fun dress up nights for our 50/50 nights.

I am at present still running the Pelican Promenaders Club at Tuggerah and once a month have a 50/50 dance as well, as we all enjoy both dance styles. Ashley Shore has been my square dance Caller for all of this time.

The originator of our 'Pelican Promenaders' Lorraine Long, recently passed away so we held a memorial 50/50 dance in her honour last Sunday afternoon. It was a very lovely occasion with a variety of square dance Callers and myself leading the proceedings.

My introduction to round dancing was at the Brisbane ANSDC in 1979 when I had driven over with two fellow dancers from Alice Springs so our square dance club which danced to tapes could have a dressed set for the convention. The convention was held at Cloudland Ballroom which sadly no longer exists and was a smaller version of the Exhibition Building in Melbourne, Victoria. It did have its own funicular railway to get people up the hill. There was a presentation under Elva Hoppe's direction and I thought how boring round dancing was.

After moving to Brisbane some six months later and being told that I would be dancing a showcase and several demonstration dances, I had a crash course and learnt how to round dance-realise that figures were step cued and danced from memory - there was no cueing like we have now. Thus I could attend my first convention in Adelaide in 1980, held at the former Chrysler manufacturing plant on a concrete floor.

Work saw me move to firstly western Queensland and then the Whitsundays and this made dancing (square or round) much harder as the nearest club to us in Proserpine was in Mackay, some 120 klms away. So we established our own square and round dance club and this is when I began cueing on a regular basis. A divorce saw me relocate to Brisbane and allowed me to dance with Linda & Owen Williamson twice a week with some square dancing as well. This is where I met Helen who through joint friends had been encouraged to learn to square dance with Jason Dean. Helen was dragged along to learn to round dance with Linda & Owen and several months later saw her attending a weekend with Karen & Dick Fisher. I was struggling with the higher level dances so it must have been incredibly difficult for her. Still we survived.

When Linda & Owen closed their club, we moved to dance with Paula & Warwick Armstrong and have remained there ever since and danced at their club night(s) and their monthly Carousel club. To help with remembering these higher level dances saw us find a hall and practise these dances weekly - a boom for the brain. We have attended interstate weekend festivals and teaching weekends and travelled to every State to attend national conventions and for most of these we have danced either or both Queensland's showcase and experimental nominations.

Currently I wear a number of hats across the State and National Associations - Secretary of Queensland Round Dance Association and (now) President and Historian of the Australian Round Dance Association, having been Vice-President for several years.


Editor's note:

Each year we ask our ARDA State/Territory representatives to commence the procedure for submitting to the ARDA Management Committee for approval, three (3) dances. These nominations must be accompanied by the full cue sheet and be in line with the Showcase & Intermediate Nominations Criteria.

The nominations submitted are on behalf of the State/Territory are presented at the Australian National Square Dance Convention.

The 2023 nominations will be listed on our National Convention Dance List as 'provisional showcases', When you are in Darwin attending the ANSDC in 2024, you will be invited to vote for the Showcase of your choice.

All Showcases will then be added to our NCDL and remain there until voted off.



At the same time ARDA requests the ARDA State/Territory representatives to commence sourcing Showcase dances, we also ask for INTERMEDIATE (formerly called Experimental) nominations.

Again, three (3) nominations are requested for approval and these also must be accompanied by the full cue sheet and be in line with the Showcase & Intermediate Criteria.

The approved nomination will be listed on our National Convention Dance List as 'inter yr 1'

Why is this being explained?? You may be invited to be part of this process within your State or Territory and, hopefully, you may be able to contribute.

The submission of the nominations is the duty of the ARDA State/Territory Representative.

2023 SHOWCASE & INTERMEDIATE NOMINATIONS will be call for very soon.



Lemons, lemons everywhere
I do declare with some despair
What can I bake? How long will it take?
Oh my goodness, will I put on weight?
So in my haste, I forget the waist and make the choice to save the world from too many LEMONS!!

LEMON DELICIOUS PUDDING Guilt free!

2 Tablespoons Caster Sugar
275 grms extra caster sugar
3 Teaspoons finely grated Lemon Rind (I add more)
4 Eggs, room temperature (separated)
90 grms Unsalted Butter, melted
150 grms Plain Flour
1 Teaspoon Baking Powder
330 ml Full Cream Milk
125 ml Lemon Juice ... maybe a tad more.

You will need to preheat your oven to 1700 C (150oC fan forced). Brush a 7 cup baking dish with softened butter. Place in the fridge for a few minutes until butter is firm. Dust baking dish with a little sugar and shake off excess.

In a large bowl, whisk the extra sugar and lemon rind until sugar is moist and aromatic. (This releases the oil in the Lemon). Add egg yolks and whisk for 1 min or until pale and creamy. Whisk in the melted butter. Slowly whisk in the milk and lemon juice, just until smooth.

In a clean bowl, using an electric mixer, whisk egg whites on low speed until stiff peaks form. Using a clean whisk, gently fold half the egg white mix into the butter mixture until just combined. Repeat with the remaining egg white mixture. Pour into prepared baking dish. Place this dish into a roasting pan and add enough HOT water to the pan to come halfway up the side of the baking dish. Carefully transfer to the oven and bake for 34-40 minutes or until the top springs back when gently touched. Pudding needs to wobble slightly.

Be careful when removing the pudding dish from the roast pan and set your LEMON DELICIOUS Pudding onto a trivet or tea towel.

This pudding is best served warm with a dollop of cream; a dollop of yoghurt or be decadent and include some lce cream.

This is a great way to use all those lovely lemons that Are so very plentiful at this time of the year. ENJOY! No doubt Oranges could be used instead of Lemons.
